

Integrity, credibility and fearlessness will guide the students and the faculty of the newly named University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill's Hussman School of Journalism and Media.

With a \$25 million endowed gift, the largest in the school's history, Carolina alumnus Walter Hussman Jr. and his family are investing in the future of journalism with hopes of restoring the public's trust in the media.

"I think the solution is to get back to these bedrock values of journalism," said Hussman, chairman of <u>WEHCO Media Inc.</u>, which owns newspapers, magazines and cable television companies in six states. "To explain to the public this is what we believe and let them know what we believe."


America has a vital interest in good journalism. But journalism confronts serious challenges. The advertising-based business model that supported it for more than a century has been disrupted. More than 1,800 U.S. newspapers have closed in the past 15 years—mostly weeklies, but also 75 dailies. Many surviving midsize metropolitan newspapers are shadows of what they once were. They have significantly reduced their news staffs and pages.

2019 NCGA Long Session Update

- State budget conference report passed late June, vetoed by Governor
- Legislature began considering several "minibus" bills, including one that appropriates over \$2 million to the N.C. Policy Collaboratory
- House overrode budget veto on 9/11; now in Senate
- Process delayed during court ordered legislative redistricting
- Both chambers taking this week off, returning on 9/30
- State government continues to operate under last year's budget



2019 Conference Budget Highlights

- No cuts to UNC (\$13.9M R proposed)
- Removal of required BOG approval of salary increases, raises
- Institutional authority to use available funds for small capital projects
- Expansion of carryforward authority
- Additional funds for faculty recruitment and retention
- Additional appropriations to Collaboratory, UNC School of Medicine Asheville Campus, Southern Regional AHEC, Eastern AHEC
